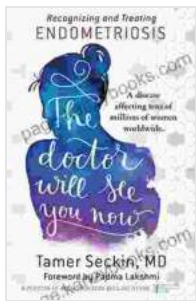

Diagnosis

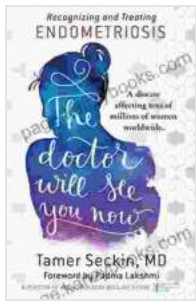

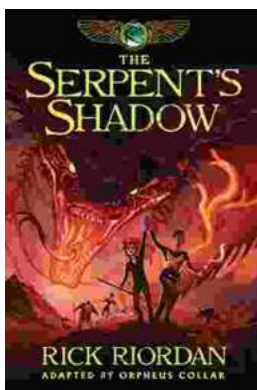
